Introduction

Introduction to the series

Shaped by the gospel: the gospel changes who we are, and calls us to live according to our new identity.

We will look at the question: how does the gospel shape the Christian's marriage?

Main idea

Big Idea: Being a child of God transforms how you treat your spouse

Disclaimer: We are all in different places in regards to marriage: some are married, some are far away from being married, some have come out of very painful/hurtful marriages. This passage will apply more immediately to you the closer you are to marriage. However it applies to everyone, because marriage is a part of our culture and lives, and the more our understanding of marriage moves towards God's intention for marriage, the better we will be able to develop our marriages, prepare for marriage, or give advice to those who are married or moving towards marriage. So, this will apply to each of us.

1 Peter 3:1-3:7

Big Idea: Being a child of God transforms how you treat your spouse

The Message

What is	What could be
Transition: this is the opposite of where we normally start (how I am treated instead of how I treat her/him)	Transition: What if we were totally focused in the wrong place
What's most important is how you treat me	How you treat your spouse is most important
What most important to us in marriage is how we are treated	God is more concerned with how you treat your spouse, than with how your spouse treats you. * abuse exception of course
 We have needs (affection, sexual intimacy, conversation, friendship, honesty, good- 	Command / what God wants them to do

looking spouse, economic security, domestic support, family commitment, admiration)

- We have **expectations**
 - Our expectations have to do with our needs
- Everything good in our marriage gets attributed to having our needs met
- All the **problems** in marriage come from unmet expectations (how we expected to be treated but aren't)
 - Divorce, separation, fights, withdrawal, complaints

1 Peter 3:1, 5-7

Wives: **Respect/submit** (to follow his leadership, pray for, speak when the Spirit guide you)

Husbands: be **comprehensive** (pastor their soul, don't be demanding))

The important thing is how you treat the other, **regardless** of how they treat you

Being a child of God transforms how you treat your spouse

Transition: But focus on the treatment I give, rather than the treatment I receive is impossible

Impossible

- Doing this does not come **naturally**, neither for men or for women
- He does not deserve it
 - o not a good leader
 - o he is not a Christian
 - o I don't feel led to follow
- She does not deserve it
 - She does not do what I want
 - She do not follow me

Transition: What if there was another motivation, another reason to do this

She is a new creation

Root /motivation

the identity of the woman as a child of God

1 Peter 3:3-7

Wife: **You're new**, your submission to your husband reveals on the outside who you are on the inside (new, submitted to God)

Husband: Your wife is a **daughter** of God loved and accepted, your sister before being your wife

Being a child of God transforms how you treat your spouse

Transition: So, now we don't see any point to marriage

Marriage has no meaning

- It takes away our reasons for getting married
 - Nobody gets married because of what they will give (in spite of love, romantic love is selfish "could not live without you")
- To think that now my needs are not the

Transition: What if there was another entirely different purpose for marriage, and instead of existing to serve your needs, marriage exists to achieve this other purpose?

Purpose: For us to help each other get to heaven

1 Peter 3:1-2, 7

Purpose / effect: their spiritual relationship (your soul, your prayers)

purpose of my marriage destroys me o opens the door to the possiblity that I will not get what I want/need from my marriage	Purpose of marriage is to help us follow Christ Ephesians parallel (for men)
Opens the door to giving without receiving This is the gospel (God gave us all, we gave nothing)	Being a child of God transforms how you treat your spouse
You can not complain about about what you aren't receiving	
Next Step Christian: • Women: What area of your marriage you see	
lack of Submission?	
 Man: What are the times when you're not kind to her? 	
 Change how you see marriage (not for your needs but to lead your spouse to Christ) 	
Non-Christian: • Be made new in Christ
